As James defines for us in James 1:27, a true religion is abstaining from worldliness and showing mercy to others. It seems 21st century American Christianity struggles to maintain this balance. Some are great at showing mercy but too much like the world. Others, like the Pharisees, are excellent at keeping themselves unstained by the world but fail to give mercy to others. When you are off-balanced, to which direction do you lean? Is this because your background has instilled this in you or pushed you away into this line of thinking?

In what ways do you struggle with elitism or separatism? What changes can you make to help you through these struggles?
