In the message, Joel shared the constant characteristics of conflict that are motivated by a **desire** that isn't met, which leads to a **demand** for that desire, which leads to **judgment** because of that unmet demand, and ultimately **punishment** for the person not providing it. As you look at the conflicts you have faced recently, how did that downward spiral play into the development of that conflict? Try to list as many different areas conflict can arise from this spiral? How does **James 1:13-15** and **4:1-3** inform our understanding of this?

How is sin described in **Genesis 4:7**? Read **1 Peter 5:8**. How is Satan described in that verse? What do both of these verses teach us about the temptations towards sin and conflict we face in our lives? How does this imagery play out in the life of Cain in thought, word, and action?

Do you think it's possible to resist the urge to give in to sin in the midst of conflict? Why or why not? **HOW** can we fight the urge to give in to anger, rage, bitterness, jealousy, envy, and aggression? Read **Romans 6** either with your CARE group or individually. How does this passage inform our position in Christ and power over the sin that seeks to dominate and destroy us?
