What aspect of Jesus's **finished** work of salvation gives you the greatest comfort? In what way does it challenge you? For example, where are you tempted to try to "add" to what Jesus has already accomplished?

If Jesus has fully and completely finished the work of salvation. . . and there is nothing that we can add to it or take away from it. . .does it make any difference if we continue to sin after we are saved? Should there be a difference in our lives after we trust in Christ fully for our salvation? What would that look like?

The Apostle Peter said in his letter, "Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God" (1 Peter 2:16). How do we do that? With your CARE group talk about how you can encourage each other to rest, celebrate and live because of the finished work of Christ as well as how fight the temptation to minimize sin because of Christ's finished work.
